## LA ROCHELLE

As our 'flagship' property, we are concentrating our efforts on La Rochelle. We have an active Mutare Committee comprising Bill Johnstone (Chairman), Nina Bauer (Secretary), Darrel Plowes and Des Becker.

The Tree Society will be visiting La Rochelle from the 17<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup> June.

Visits and interaction with other local societies are most welcome, in particular Birdlife Zimbabwe, the Orchid Society and the Aloe and Succulent Society as La Rochelle offers something of interest to you all.

With the visit in November last year of Oliver Maurice, Property Director of the International National Trust Organisation, we feel less 'isolated' and the INTO have been most supportive and concerned with our situation in Zimbabwe.

It is hoped that we will soon have a voluntary visit from a National Trust employee on a two month sabbatical who will assist in drawing up a new Management Plan for La Rochelle.

We are very excited to have excellent contact with the Orchid Society of Zimbabwe and look forward to welcoming Joe Goncalves, the OSZ Chairman at La Rochelle within the next couple of months to give an appraisal of the orchid collection.

## 4. INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

The INTO CONFERENCE is to be held in Victoria, Canada from 12<sup>th</sup> – 15<sup>th</sup> October 2011. It is hoped that the NTZ will be able to have a delegate attend the conference, depending upon sponsorship being made available.

The 14th International Conference of National Trusts will be held in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, on October 12 -15, 2011. The conference will be hosted by The Land Conservancy of British Columbia and by the Heritage Canada Foundation, and will welcome National Trusts and like-minded organizations from around the world.

The conference theme is **CONNECTING PEOPLE, PLACES AND STORIES: New Strategies for Conservation in a Changing World**. It will address our current thinking and experience regarding the impacts of climate change and cultural changes on the conservation of the world's natural and cultural heritage. We will explore new approaches to the protection of special places as well as our more intangible heritage – our stories, traditions, languages and cultures. And we will seek new ways to better engage people and communities in this work.

The Nuu-chah-nulth people in British Columbia have a saying: "Hishuk-ish Tsawaak", which means "Everything is Connected." We will embrace this principle as we move forward to find solutions.

### **CONFERENCE OBJECTIVES**

The ISC SBH - International Scientific Committee on Shared Built Heritage of ICOMOS in association with the ICOMOS South Africa in collaboration with South African heritage organisations organised the first International Scientific Conference on shared built heritage in South Africa regarding Shared Built Heritage in Africa.

The conference will take place in Cape Town, from the 3rd to 8th of July 2011 and will include, amongst other, site visits to significant heritage sites that best reflects the built heritage that South Africa shares with other countries and cultures. Similarly, sites that demonstrate some of the challenges and provides insight into innovative programmes that is geared towards achieving a more holistic approach in conservation management, will be discussed.
